

Immigrants and Voting: 2008 Election Profile ALASKA

Total Electoral College Votes: 3

Electoral and Popular Vote Choice in 2004 General Election: Republican (Bush: 61%)

Total Citizens eligible to vote (2006): 475,132

Naturalized Citizens eligible to vote (2006): 22,361

- In 2006, the foreign born represented 7.0 percent (or 47,066) of Alaska's total population (670,053), compared with 5.9 percent in 2000 and 4.5 percent in 1990
- Alaska's foreign-born population increased by 9,896 (or 26.6 percent) between 2000 and 2006 (from 37,170 to 47,066)
- Alaska's foreign-born citizen population increased by 2,403 (or 12.0 percent) between 2000 and 2006 (from 20,011 to 22,414)
- Alaska's foreign-born voting eligible population (18+) increased by 3,400 (or 17.9 percent) between 2000 and 2006 (from 18,961 to 22,361)

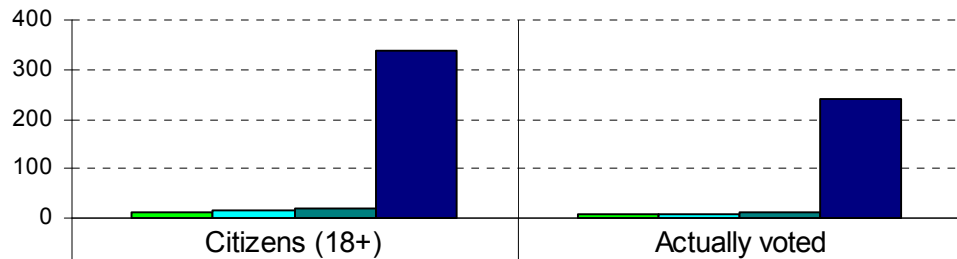

- Hispanics represented 4.3 percent of the voting eligible population in Alaska in 2006 (20,645 out of 475,132)
 - The Hispanic population represented 2.9 percent of state projected voters**
- Of the foreign born in Alaska, 21.8 percent reported Hispanic or Latino origins
- Of the native born in Alaska, 4.8 percent reported Hispanic or Latino origins

*Tabulations do not include American Indian, Alaska Native, Native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islander voters because of their small sample size in the November 2004 CPS

**Pew Hispanic Center calculates the projected Hispanic share of votes by multiplying the Hispanic share of eligible voters by the difference in turnout between Hispanics and non-Hispanics. The national average has been used in this calculation due to a lack of reliable information on Hispanic voter turnout at the state level.
