4. To make progress in the study and knowledge of the history, structure and profiles of the Mexican community abroad .

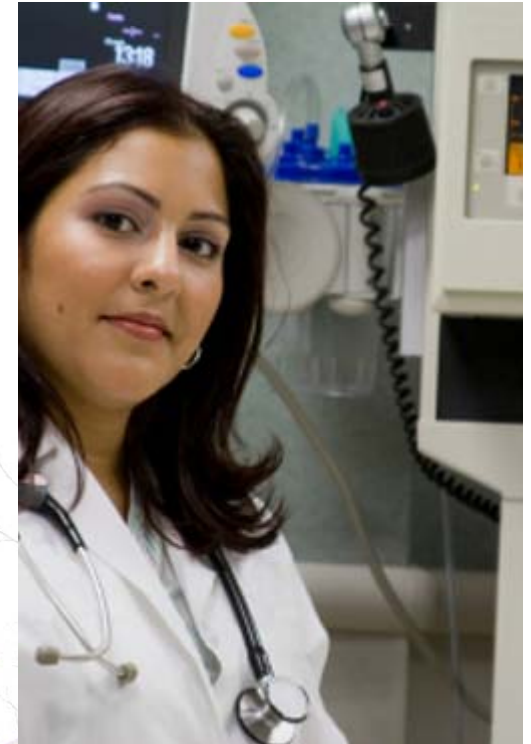


STRATEGIC CHALLENGES



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5. To create a comprehensive system of information and dissemination that makes intensive use of technologies.
6. To update and expand educational opportunities to emerging segments of the community abroad.
7. To strengthen the migrants mental health care with the support of the effective and extensive existing infrastructure.
8. To ensure that the Advisory Council of IME begins a time of reflection, review and reform. The council should be a more consultative, more constructive and more representative one.

9. To develop a new public policy linking remittances to regional development and job creation.
10. To organize and systematically make the most of the variety and richness of talented mexicans abroad.
11. To globalize the programs and services offered by IME abroad.
12. To position the mexican experience in the care of its Diaspora as a key instrument of international cooperation policy.
13. To promote a better coordination of federal policies of community protection and community promotion of mexicans abroad.
14. To be able to depend less on fiscal budgets through alliances with national and international foundations and the private sector.
